From the Pastor's Desk Thoughts from *Corpus Christi*

Dear Parishioners,

One benefit of writing this weekly bulletin message is that my thoughts / message can potentially reach more people each Sunday. I usually preach at every Mass in our parish each weekend, but all of you, my parishioners, can also read my thoughts here weekly in the church bulletin. Moreover, since I post this same message online (www.fr-ed-namiotka.com), others who are not in the parish (or may be away) can have this same opportunity via the internet.

Corpus Christi (*The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ*) is a time for us to reflect on the precious gift that we have in the Most Holy Eucharist. While this solemnity is celebrated universally on the *Thursday* after *Trinity Sunday*, the Church in the United States celebrates *Corpus Christi* on the *Sunday* following Trinity Sunday.

I have had the opportunity during my life to see both **Pope St. John Paul II** and **Pope Benedict XVI** when they were in the USA—Philadelphia, Miami, Denver, East Rutherford (New Jersey) and Washington, DC—in addition to meeting **Pope St. John Paul II** in Rome. There was always a great deal of **preparation** before meeting a pope. I remember various details like being thoroughly scrutinized by the *US Secret Service*, patiently waiting in a secure area *for hours* before the Pope's arrival, making sure I was wearing a nice vestment and looking my very best, etc. There was plenty of **preparation** to meet the *Vicar of Christ*. Yet, don't we have someone much more important than the pope present on our altars at every Mass—**Jesus Christ** himself. How do we prepare for **Him**?

I suggest we think about a few things as we **prepare** to meet **Christ** at each Mass:

Do I take seriously the *hour fast* from food and drink prior to receiving Holy Communion? (This fast would also include items like *gum* and *breath mints*.)

Am I sure that I am in not in the state of *serious sin* before receiving Holy Communion? If I am, I should refrain from receiving Holy Communion until I first make a sacramental confession.

When I receive—whether it is *on the tongue* or *in the hand*—do I do so with the proper reverence and respect that I should show to the *Son of God*? Am I dressed in a manner befitting a meeting with the *Son of God*? (Would you actually dress this way if you were to meet the Pope, a Bishop or some other dignitary?)

Do I make a *proper thanksgiving* after receiving Holy Communion? The religious sisters taught me at the time of my *First Holy Communion* to tell Jesus that I love Him, to thank Him for everything that He does for me, to petition Him for what I need in my life and to tell Him that I am truly sorry for all of my sins. I think that these components of a proper thanksgiving are still relevant today. There is nothing more frustrating to me as a priest than those who continually leave Church *directly* after receiving Jesus in Holy Communion without making a proper thanksgiving.

If I am unable to receive Jesus in Holy Communion because of some circumstance of my life, do I make a *Spiritual Communion* instead? Request that Jesus come to you spiritually in your heart since you cannot now receive Him in Holy Communion.

While the suggestions listed here are far from complete, if we believe and realize that we truly have **Jesus, the Son of God** present on our altars and in our tabernacles, then I think that the way we pray, worship and receive Holy Communion should reflect this core belief.

The Church in the USA is in need of an “Eucharistic Revival”. Many just take the whole thing for granted. “Yeah, I know it is there”. Some feel unworthy and so they don’t receive JESUS. Others just receive because “that is what everyone does.” And others, sadly enough, think it is only a piece of bread, and some just don’t know what to do. These thoughts are real. At the “last supper table” or what we remember as Holy Thursday, there were the 12 disciples, and as we know, none of them were sinless. One betrayed JESUS, others denied knowing him. Most ran away when the soldiers came and some just hid in the crowd. Yet JESUS gave himself to them all. He knew what was about to happen, but he did not refuse to give of himself to each of them. The Eucharist is “**Mystery**”. We will never fully understand it and it will always require FAITH. The Eucharist is a recalling of JESUS’ **sacrifice** on the cross, and his obedience to God the Father. We are invited to offer our life as sacrifice. There is much to endure in it.

Ultimately, knowing and serving JESUS and receiving him in the Eucharist is about “**relationship**”. We know that JESUS so much desires a relationship with the Human Family, individually as well as collectively. “For we are the Temple of the living God just as God said. “I will dwell in them and walk among them. I will be their God and they shall be my people). (2 Cor, 6:16) **Denying the**



REAL PESENCE IN THE EUCHARIST shows a decline in faith, in the understanding of JESUS’ **sacrifice** and missing out on a real, true **relationship** with JESUS. Knowing JESUS and being in relationship with him does require acceptance of mystery, sacrifice and relationship.

Small Christian Community Faith Sharing

Please note that we put the following week's Gospel passage in this space so you can prepare all week for Proclamation of the Gospel the following Sunday. Faith Sharing helps ordinary people connect their faith with everyday life experiences.

Excerpt from the Gospel for the Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, June 26, 2022 - Luke 9:51-62

(Jesus enters a village where he is not accepted. James and John want to call down fire from heaven to punish the unwelcoming people. Jesus rebukes them. They continue on their journey where Jesus encounters various people who wish to follow Him but are unwilling to do so NOW.) "And to another Jesus said, 'Follow me.' But he replied, 'Lord, let me go first and bury my father.' But Jesus answered him, 'Let the dead bury their dead. But you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God.'"

Commentary:

Some passages in Scripture are called "hard sayings" because they seem harsh to the ear. The third person who comes to Jesus wants to bury his father before he follows Jesus. We imagine rigor mortis setting in on the deathbed, but that's not what this fellow means. He is actually saying that he's willing to follow Jesus after the death of his father. In all of the instances mentioned in this gospel, Jesus replies in basically the same way: Come now, and come without terms, or don't come at all. We have to put ourselves at the service of the kingdom of God in the present hour, because it's the only hour that belongs to us.

Questions for Reflection and Sharing:

1. What is God saying to me in this Gospel passage?
2. What word or phrase in this Gospel speaks to me?
3. What word or phrase in the Commentary resonates with me?

Religious Freedom Week June 22-29

The theme for this year is *Life and Dignity for All*. This year, as we approach the Supreme Court's decision in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) is especially mindful of the debates around our country about abortion. The Catholic Church plays a crucial role in bearing witness to the gospel of life and serving all who will be affected by these discussions and their outcomes. Moreover, the USCCB's Committee for Religious Liberty has collaborated with the Office of International Justice and Peace to raise awareness about [religious liberty in China](#) and in solidarity with people throughout the world who suffer for their faith.

Domestically, a major area of concern continues to be freedom for Catholic institutions, such as schools, hospitals, and child welfare service providers, to carry out their missions with integrity. In particular, [protecting Catholic adoption and foster care](#) will become even more vital, as we take new steps in building a culture of life and dignity for all in the United States.

The USCCB continues to advocate for the essential right of religious freedom for Catholics and for those of *all faiths*.

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


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
