St. Thomas More is working with the Catholic Charities' Prison Ministry to collect underwear and socks for inmates who are in need of clothing. The Camden Jail provides the jumpsuits for the inmates, but not the underwear.



Many of the incarcerated have no money and no family or friends to provide the underwear. Also some come in with underwear in such a condition that it must be disposed of. Therefore there is nothing to give them upon release. What is needed is White Crew socks for men and women. For females – white sports bras and white briefs. Refugee Families

Our Society of St. Vincent de Paul continues to work with Catholic Charities to assist Refugee families with their food related needs. Three families no longer need assistance because they returned to work from an illness or found new employment. Each of these families are so grateful for the help they received in their brief time of need. Most refugee families are one illness or brief unemployment aware from poverty. Currently, St.VdeP is assisting two Afghan families who recently came to the

US. One family got the name of an Afghan man in Sicklerville and asked him for help. He did not know them but took them into his own home until he found them a place to rent. They are a family of 7 (5 children - 4 are in school and one is a pre-schooler). None speak English. The father lost his vision in one eye. They come from a very remote part of Afghanistan and have a big adjustment to life in the US. *Matthew* 25:31-40 "I was hungry and you gave me food, thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me."
